From the Desk of Father James

Dear Parishioners,

Ash Wednesday is *this* Wednesday, and it kicks -off the 6 weeks of Lent. Last week I wrote about the three ways by which we are invited to engage this Holy Season: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. This week I wanted to draw your attention to one particular Lenten initiative which our parish will be participating in: the CRS Rice Bowl.

You will find cardboard bowls in the back of the church. These are distributed to families and used to collect donations for CRS (Catholic Relief Services), which is the international aid agency of our *American* Catholic Church. The Rice Bowl project particularly raises money to feed the hungry, both domestically and internationally. 25% of donations goes toward feeding the hungry in America and 75% goes toward feeding the hungry internationally. The Rice Bowls will be collected at the end of Lent.

The agency which facilitates this initiative is Catholic Relief Services, which is the international aid arm of the American Catholic Church. Catholic Relief Services is an organization that we can be proud of, and it is one that I whole-heartedly recommend when it comes to supporting those affected by international tragedies such as the Ukrainian War or the Turkey-Syria Earthquake. I say that it is an organization that we can be proud of because it is consistently one of the highest rated international aid agencies. The organization "Charity Watch," which thoroughly examines the finances and operations of various charities, gives them the very rare grade of an A+. Consider that Doctors Without Borders only gets an A, the American Red Cross an A-, the American Wildlife Foundation a B+ and the American Cancer Society a B-.

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments-Bystanders can help.

Bystanders can play a big role in stopping bullying. When people do nothing, it sends a message that it's no big deal to bully. If people say something, it sends a social message that bullying is not OK. If you see someone being bullied, you can help by doing these things: *Speak up to help*: If it feels safe and natural to speak up, say, "come on, let's get out of here" to the person being bullied. It is okay to let the bully know people are watching and will get involved. *Report it*: Let a trusted adult know what you witnessed. This isn't tattling, it is standing up for what's right. *Offer support*: Check in with the person who was being bullied. Ask how they are doing. Remind them that the bullying is not their fault. Online criminals will often search church bulletins to look for email addresses and phone numbers of potential victims. They will then create an email account with which they will fraudulently impersonate the pastor of the church or some other church employee. If you get an email or text from someone claiming to be Fr. James or another representative of the parish, and that email or text asks for gift cards or personal information, please forward it to Fr. CRS RICE BOWL



OUR FASCINATING FAITH

Ashes

There are three major Biblical traditions concerning ashes: repentance, mourning, and mortality, and they are interrelated. Repeatedly throughout the Bible we encounter the use of ashes (often together with sackcloth) as a penitential practice. A similar practice is seen when someone is in mourning or distress. And ashes are a metaphor for human life, which is seen as brief and destined to end in death:

Ashes are the result of fire, the complete burning of something that was alive. They are ephemeral; the slightest puff of air can send them away into nothingness. It is easy to see how ashes came to symbolize fleeting human life or the humility of repentance.

Ashes can represent other things as well. For example, ashes are often used to fertilize our gardens and fields. Ash is therefore necessary to bring about and nourish life.

We can now begin to see how appropriate a symbol ashes are for the season of Lent. For Lent is not only a time of repentance, of sorrow for our sins. It is a baptismal season of preparation for the new life of our catechumens and of recalling the new life of our own baptism. We start Lent in ashes, and end it in Easter. What will the ashes mean to you this Lent?

As temples of the Spirit, we belong to Christ and to one another. This mutual belonging is a blessing and a challenge. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus sets a high bar for Christian community: his followers must love not only those who are easy to love, but also the people who upset us. Together, let us ask God to give us this kind of love.


